
School days just now are rather different for pupils and teachers when many of you are having school at home. But we are still very lucky. Let us have a look at school days a long time ago.

They may have used the lines to guide them when placing a ruler to draw straight lines on paper. However, paper was very expensive and not readily available. I wonder if you all know what this is? In Sunday school younger children sat on chairs. There wouldn't have been carpet





These were the benches older children sat on. Why do they have slots in by the metal bars supporting the top backrest? These benches were very heavy and the cast iron is so strong and solid that many survived until today. The wood work was more likely to rot but with care this too has been preserved until now. After Sunday school, older children moved into Junior church and became members of the church as young adults.

Answers:

The sunshine coming in through the thin curtails or the cockerel crowing would have wakened everyone.

Children would have walked or run to school probably across the fields in the countryside.

The cane! Perhaps you could ask the older members of your family about this.

The slots in the benches were so that the backrest could be used in different positions. The children faced the front, for the beginning of Sunday school, to listen to the person in charge and to sing hymns and to pray and then some needed to face away from the front to join other children in their class and the teacher for a lesson.
