Reception

In our Reception class this week, Pancakes, Chinese New Year and Valentines have shaped the learning. The children have made lists of ingredients to help Mr Wolf with his pancakes. Then, after watching Mrs Rogers make pancakes, the children thought of words to describe how they might taste and then either made them for real or designed their own on paper. The children have also measured to find the tallest and smallest and the longest and the shortest and used their "Days of the Week" song to help order the days. The children concluded their research about Polar Regions with a great rap from CBeebies Andy and some fantastic writing to complete their penguin life cycles. On Friday, the children learnt all about Chinese New Year, discovering how and why Chinese New Year is celebrated. What a lot of learning, Reception. Wow!

Year 1

In English, the Year 1 children have been busy with their 'Explorers' unit. They have planned and recorded their own adventure stories of an expedition to the South Pole and have used a variety of sentence openers to make their writing more interesting for the reader. In Maths, the children have looked at related families for subtraction and addition. They have also worked on word problems by identifying the important information to help solve the sum. During topic work,

our Year 1 children have found out about safe and unsafe secrets. They have also discovered facts about Ernest Shackleton, drawn self-portraits using colour to show emotions and have celebrated Chinese New Year. Year 1 have worked tremendously hard and should definitely enjoy a well-earned rest!

Year 2

In science, the children have been investigating which objects are opaque and which objects are transparent. Year 4

This week in maths, the children have started their work on the complicated area of fractions. They have been learning what a mixed number is and how they can order them on a number line. Year 4 have learnt this week about what makes a natural disaster and what must happen for something to be classed as a natural disaster! Year 5

In science, the children have been learning about the role of astronomers and have researched famous astronomers throughout history. What a lot of interesting facts they found out! In music, Year 5 have been learning the song "Ain't No Mountain High Enough" and "The Quartermaster's Store" a traditional folk song about a 'Quartermaster' the officers in the army responsible for making sure everyone in the army has the correct equipment and materials for them to do their jobs. Year 6

This week, Year 6 have been studying statistics in maths, with a particular focus on reading, understanding and drawing line graphs. In English, following their recent focus on Philippe Petit, the children have used their knowledge of formal vocabulary to write a balanced argument on the topic: Should Philippe Petit have walked between the twin towers? Whilst studying the phenomenon of light, our Year 6 class explored reflection and how it can be used; this included working on one of the courses on Seneca, an interactive website which the children are now using. After two weeks of learning the skills of stop-motion, and starting to put it into practice, this week is the final week on the topic. The animations already seen have been superb. Well done, Year 6.

Mega Mileage Challenge

Following the successful completion of the Excalibur staff team's challenge, we are now challenging all members of the school to take part and travel the virtual distance between John o' Groats to Land's End. Click the following link to watch Mrs. Thompson and Mr. Hancock launch this whole-school

Now, every fortnight, class teachers will put a task on Seesaw entitled "John o' Groats to Land's End Challenge" where you will be able to send photos and videos of you walking, running or biking. You can also send your total mileage through Seesaw as well. The total mileage will then be calculated and there will be updates on the newsletters.

As well as the whole-school challenge, the Excalibur staff team are now attempting to travel the length of the equator, a total of 24,901 miles.

You can stay up-to-date with the progress by checking out the "Mega Mileage Challenges" on the school website.

This week, the groups of children in school have been busy working on building up their mileage by doing laps of the path around the field. Reception have totalled 9 miles and Year 2 have racked up 78 miles between them.

Total Staff Mileage (since February 1st): 520.42 miles We have 24,381 miles left to get all the way around the equator!
