## Frequently asked questions

## Who can contact the Education Welfare Officer for support and advice about attendance?

- Child or young person
- Schools
- Parents
- Partner Agencies, e.g. Police and School Health
- General Public

# What do we do for parents?

- Help parents to understand their rights and legal responsibilities.
- Assist parents with problems concerning attendance
- Support and develop links between school and home
- Provide a link to other education services and agencies
- Signpost what support is available after assessing what is needed
- Support as part of the Common Assessment Framework (CAF)
  - The CAF helps to work out what you and your child might need to get the right support at an early stage before the needs or worries get bigger

## What sort of things do parents contact the Education Welfare Service about?

- Their child refusing to attend school.
- Truanting from school.
- For advice on the regulations concerning child employment and entertainment licences.

# Remember

Education Welfare Officers are there to help you and your child because they know how important attendance at school is to children's attainment, friendships, confidence and achievement.







# Children and Families Service Education Welfare Service

## The school is unhappy with my child's attendance and are going to involve an Education Welfare Officer. What will the Education Welfare Officer do?

- Contact you to arrange a meeting
- Meet you to talk about the reasons for your child's poor attendance and discuss your concerns.
- Give you help and advice to improve your child's attendance.
- Assess the situation and draw up a support plan with you, your child and the school.
- In consultation with the School, consider the use of a Fixed Penalty Notice.
- Instigate legal proceedings in cases where school attendance does not improve.

# Why is attendance at school and punctuality important?

**Because Every Second Counts:** 

- 5 minutes late each day means three whole days lost each year
- 17 days missed from school each year equates to a whole GCSE grade
- Attendance affects learning
- Attendance affects future outcomes
- Attendance affects wellbeing and a sense of belonging
