Dear Parents/Carers,

Thank you for completing the annual survey! We had 49 replies which is great. You will see that the overall majority of returns show us that you are happy with much of the work of the school and particularly value the friendliness of the school, our open door policy, our communication with you and the varied learning experiences for the children.

The collated responses will be fed back, discussed and evaluated by all staff and the governing body. The senior leadership team will use your feedback, in conjunction with other sources of data, to help us to plan what works well in our school and what can be further improved through our school improvement process.

You will see that despite the majority of our pupils telling us they would like to change the uniform to include a tie, 80% of parents/carers have expressed that they do not think this is a good idea - therefore we shall postpone plans for this.

We appreciate all of your comments and it is heartening to hear that the hard work of staff and the effort that is made by all the school community is impacting positively on our children. You have given us some good ideas too and we will be discussing these further - some we can act on straight away, for example we will be offering a cricket (striking and fielding) club this term and we are planning to repeat the maths information evening in the summer term. Some are more difficult to act upon, such as more male teachers (which is a national trend in primary unfortunately).

You will see some suggestions/comments highlighted and commented on below - this is because the information already exists or we feel we can give further information now which may help to offer clarification. We hope that you find this useful.

## Separating younger ones from older ones on playground/ section off the playground

The playground is zoned at playtimes, so only one class plays on specific areas at a time; such as the A frame area or the fort, or has access to equipment. There are zones for just K51 and just K52, but importantly areas where the children from any year group can come together to play should they wish to, such as the quiet areas and around the friendship bench. We encourage our older pupils to take care of our younger children through structured programmes such as play leading, peer counselling and the house captain system. In this way, we seek to balance the social interaction of the children, the wholeness of the school community and the safety of pupils accessing resources and climbing equipment appropriate to their size and age. Teachers will be reminding all classes of this zoning system and of the options open to them at playtimes.

We work very hard to give as much notice of events as we can. The Easter service date went out from Newsletter 4, 21/10/15; giving 4 months 'notice. Christmas date was on from Newsletter 3, 9/10/15 giving 9 weeks' notice. Unfortunately, harvest assembly had less notice as it falls so early within the academic year. There are some events from external agencies that we are told about in less time e.g music events such as the Y4 brass concert, but we endeavour to get this information out to you as soon as we have it. May we ask you to check general newsletters carefully for dates - they always appear at the end of the letter and we try and put any new dates added in bold. If you miss a letter, they are all uploaded to our website and dates are added (as soon as we are able) to the website calendar also. We will feedback to teaching staff to give dates for class assemblies as soon as possible. We are unable to find any events, which parents/carers needed to know of, that have been announced on the morning themselves, so if you have any further information of when this has happened specifically please do let us know, so that we can rectify this for the future.

### how the house points work

All children in all classes can earn house point tokens from any member of staff for a range of things: progress, academic achievement, good manners, great homework, being a good friend, being helpful or reliable or persevering and so on. Children who get 'star of the week' automatically earn 5 tokens for their house. The tokens are collected from the classes and put into the plastic boxes in the entrance hall so the children can see how well their house is doing. At the end of each half term they are emptied and counted up. The winning house then receives the house cup in assembly with their coloured ribbons on and the children belonging to the winning house earn a non-uniform day – usually on the second day back after the half term break (so that we can remind them about it on the first day back!). Winners are also celebrated on the header on the website, so you can check there at the end of each half term if your child forgets who has won.

### co-ordinate holidays with the high school

For a number of years, all Alsager schools (including the high school) have consulted and co-ordinated with each other to ensure the same holiday dates. There may be slight differences when, for example, a school has to take an INSET day on a specific date because it has to close for elections (such as our school) or when certain tasks have to be undertaken (moderation at the high school for example). There are 5 INSET days schools must take each year and some schools will be tied into when they have to take them, but the main dates should be the same.

### more teacher input & help with the PTA

F.O.E does a fantastic job for everyone's children. They organise some brilliant events for us all. Teachers support after school evening events such as the Christmas, Easter and Summer fairs and termly discos by: manning stalls, counting and banking money, tidying up, putting furniture away, locking up the school and supervising children. Occasionally, some teachers may be unable to attend an event due to family or social commitments, but the majority of staff is in attendance and support events regularly. There is always staff representation at Friends of Excalibur meetings, which are held approximately every 6 weeks and start at 7.30pm in Alsager. Teachers are unable to help shop for events, set up the events or pitch in during lunchtime gift wraps for example as they are either in the classroom teaching, preparing afternoon lessons or eating their lunch. Teachers help to promote any competitions by planning and holding special assemblies as necessary and by reminding pupils about special events being held. They also encourage children to take part by joining in non-uniform days and other events and competitions.

# more transparency about how school budget is spent

Information about any maintained school's budget has been available via the DfE site for a number of years. There is a link to this on our website. Furthermore - the governors at Excalibur made the decision last year to publish non confidential part 1 minutes on our website.
